


Oby Onyioha – A Nigerian Music Icon




I WANT TO FEEL YOUR LOVE.


Oby Onyioha, one of the doyens of the Nigerian music industry, first burst onto the Nigerian music scene with the chart bursting 'I Want to Feel Your Love' album that took the Nigerian music world by storm in the 1980's. This was followed by an equally big hit 'Break It' around the same period, all this at a time when disco and breakdance music was considered the exclusive domain of western artistes. Its novelty and unprecedented release catapulted her into being the singular pioneer of the disco and break-dance music in Nigeria at a time when there was a paucity of the genre.

It was new; it was refreshing, more especially as the tracks were sprinkled with some memorable African songs. She became the first Nigerian female scholastic achiever to venture into the music business, a vocation that had hitherto been denigrated as a profession for the 'academically challenged' female.

She therefore played a big part in helping to break that perception of the Nigerian female musician.



• Oby had no formal training in music. But her discography dates back to Oby at age 8 when she started singing on television and in her School and Church choir. She had her Primary School education at Methodist School Uwani, Enugu. Her High School education was at Queen's School Enugu. Oby graduated from Oakland University, Rochester, Michigan with a B.A in History and a double Concentration in Business Management and African History. She later went on to obtain an M.A./ Ph.D. in Social Anthropology, and a Ph.D. in Natural Theology. Oby Onyioha's I WANT TO FEEL YOUR LOVE was so successful that at an auction in Europe the vinyl record sold for \$1700!

- Her Album 'Break It' was the biggest test she had faced in a pretty long time. But the whole effort had been well-worth it as many would agree on listening to the Album.

- What happened to Oby was disillusionment in the integrity of Nigerian music Executives and Marketers. With corruption so rife within the industry, and having a sound education to fall back on, she decided to quit the music scene and concentrate on making a living by other means

Oby Onyioha's music is an introduction into mostly old and classic African centred melodies, lyrics,
expressions, sentimentality and interpretations, with some influences reflecting a musical universality with
other cultures over the centuries. The result is a dynamic synthesis that showcases African music in a fluidity
of sound, weaving seamlessly from African into western and other influences and back again creating a genre
